Less than six months from now, a very important event will take place.

In April, 2010, the United States Census Bureau will conduct its survey to find out just how many Americans there really are. The 2010 Census is a count of everyone living in our country. It is mandated by the U.S. Constitution. Everyone not just U.S. citizens — is counted.

The census count is extremely important to Harvard, according to Mayor Jay Nolan. "We receive State and Federal funds based on our population," he explained. "A short count means that Harvard won't get its fair share of those funds which are used for schools, transportation, healthcare, housing and more."

### **Preparing For Winter**

Winter is just around the corner. The cost of road salt has decreased. The City will not mix the salt with sand this year, but will continue last year's salting policies to ensure that there is sufficient salt on hand for the season. The downtown area, the areas around the schools and emergency routes will be salted as usual. Intersections and steep grades will also be maintained as in the past. The rest of the streets in the city will be plowed only. We ask all drivers to please drive with caution this winter.

The City's winter parking restrictions have not changed. All vehicles must be off the streets following a two-inch snowfall. This enables city

workers to plow and salt the roads quickly. If a snow emergency is declared, all vehicles must be removed from the streets immediately. A snow emergency can be declared before an expected **Big Brothers Big Sisters** two-inch snowfall and will be posted on

the electronic Community Sign as soon as possible. If there is any question as to whether an emergency had been called or terminated, call the Public Works Dept. at either 943-0301 or 943-4161, or the Police Department's non-emergency number at 943-4431.

Federal legislative boundaries. After the census is concluded, Congressional, State Senate and State House districts will be redrawn based on the new population information.

The 2010 Census questionnaire will be one of the shortest in history, consisting of only 10 questions. It will take about 10 minutes to complete. Strict laws protect the confidentiality of respondents and the information that is shared during the census process. No one has access to it outside of the Census Bureau. The City of Harvard only receives a broad analysis of the data and does not see the completed individual surveys.

Mayor Nolan urges all Harvard residents to respond and be counted to ensure that Harvard gets its fair share of State and Federal funding.

### Hydrant Flushing Schedule

The City's Utilities department will be flushing dead end water lines during the weeks of October 19-30. Hydrant flushing may create rust and brown colored water. The water is safe to drink but will stain any clothes that are washed in it. If you experience rusty water, let your faucet run until clear.

### **Special Recreation Fun**

I'd like to take this opportunity to provide Harvard families with some Halloween safety suggestions to ensure that our kids have a safe and fun holiday:

#### **Reminders for Children**

- Always carry a flashlight while Trick or Treating;
- Trick or Treat with an adult or older sibling;
- Only Trick or Treat at homes with a porch light on;
- Never enter anyone's home;
- Costumes should be brightly colored and have reflective material;
- Avoid ill-fitting masks that make it hard to see. Use non-toxic, hypo-allergenic makeup or face paint instead to maintain unobstructed vision:
- Costumes and shoes should be fitted to avoid tripping; • Do not carry fake swords, guns, knives, or similar accessories that look real. Make sure that any accessories are flexible and cannot harm you or others;
- Don't run. You have three hours to Trick or Treat;
- Don't cross the street between parked cars. Always cross at an intersection;
- Walk on sidewalks. Don't run between homes or on the lawn;
- Respect other people's property;
- Trick or Treat on a designated route;
- Carry an extra Trick or Treat bag in case yours fills up or breaks;
- Never eat any treats until your parent or guardian has checked them under bright lighting for tampering. Do not eat fruit, homemade items, or unwrapped candy; and
- Always say Thank You and have fun!



### **Reminders for Parents**

- Review the above safety tips with your children;

- Always inspect your children's treats for tampering;
- Accompany your children while they Trick or Treat;
- Consider hosting a Halloween party to replace Trick or Treating;
- If you are driving, be cautious of children who may not be paying attention;
- Review 'Stop, Drop, and Roll' with your children in the event that a costume catches fire; and
- Report any suspicious activities to the Harvard Police at (815) 943-4431 or call 9-1-1 in an emergency.

### **Reminders for Homeowners**

- Turn your porch light on if you are inviting Trick or Treaters;
- Do not invite children into your home;
- Only distribute prepackaged treats;
- · Secure your dogs in your home to avoid contact with Trick or Treaters;
- Remove any hazards from your yard or porch that could cause a child to trip and fall;
- Do not use candles to illuminate any decoration;
- Report any suspicious activities to the Harvard Police at (815) 943-4431 or call 9-1-1 in an emergency.
