Join us on Friday, November 21 at 4:30 p.m. to 'cut the ribbon' on the City's recently-completed streetscape program and to watch the holiday lights come on in Downtown Harvard.

Both events will take place at the Community Sign at Five Points. Civic leaders will officially 're-open' the downtown area, which now sports new lighting, sidewalks, curbs and walkways and amenities such as planters and benches. Several

downtown buildings have also received facelifts from their owners.

Harvard will then 'flip the switch' on its holiday lighting program, which features lit wreathes on more than 70 new light posts. A new era will officially begin for the downtown district.

The City is working with the Harvard EDC to help building owners recruit the types of businesses that Harvard residents say they need and want. Call the HEDC at 943-1036 to learn about special programs that may be available to help bring your business to Downtown Harvard.



From Your City Library ...

Often, our newest materials aren't available to browse, because they are quickly checked out by local patrons or by borrowers in the greater library system. Our library shares all of its materials with seven other libraries and they, in turn, share with us.

We have created a new procedure to make it easier to know 'what's new at the Library'. Here's how it works: Look for display of cards for new titles in the new books section and bring that card to the desk to be among the first to request new material. The card will then be returned to the section for others to browse. New books can now be checked out for three weeks. You can also suggest books, movies, music and audio books that you think the library should own.

You can access a wide range of Library services from home, using your library card barcode number. By logging in through the Library's web page, you can look up magazine articles in the Ebsco Masterfile, do genealogical research using HeritageQuest, or check to see which titles came first in a book



series by looking in NoveList. You can also place holds, renew many items and check your 'reading history' by logging into your account.

Additional online databases can be accessed at the Library. Ask a staff member to log you on to check out sites such as the Auto Repair Reference Center, the Consumer Health Index for medical references, or Books in Print covering available, out-of-print, forthcoming and other formats of fiction and non-fiction titles.

Check the library's website for upcoming events, programs and special displays — wherever you may be!

Please keep these City ordinances in mind as we move through the Fall and Winter seasons:

- Open burning within the City of Harvard is prohibited;
- Blowing grass and leaves into the street is prohibited;
- Parking on any City street between 2 a.m. and 5 a.m. is prohibited;
- Depositing snow into the street is prohibited;
- Do not park across a sidewalk; and
- Loud music that can be heard from distances greater then 50 feet is often prohibited.

Salt Shortage This Winter!

Winter is just around the corner.

As most of you have heard, road salt is in short supply this winter. Salt that is available costs the City of Harvard \$141.00 a ton compared to the \$40.65 per ton that we paid a year ago. Due to both factors, the City was able to purchase less than half of last year's total. We will mix sand with the salt to make our supply last through the winter. This will help extend the salt supply, but will not solve the shortage.

To ensure we have enough salt, the City has made several policy decisions. The downtown area, the areas around the schools and the emergency routes will be salted as usual. Intersections and steep grades will also be maintained as in the past. The rest of the streets in the city will be plowed only. We ask all drivers to please drive with caution this winter.

Please remember that after a 2" snowfall, all vehicles should be off the streets. This allows us to plow and salt the roads quickly. If a snow emergency is declared, all vehicles should be removed from the streets. A snow emergency can be declared before a 2" snowfall. A snow emergency will be posted on the community sign as soon as possible. If you are unsure whether an emergency has been called or terminated, call Public Works at 943-4161 or the police station at 943-4431.

Harvard Events Committee

Last fall, the City Council created the Harvard Events Committee to plan and organize recreational events for the enrichment of the community. Since then, the Committee has organized Christmas in Harvard and the Old Fashioned Country Fair. The Committee is seeking resident input as to what type of events are wanted.
