

From the Mayor's Desk





Many of you may have noticed new activity in downtown Harvard recently, as the City gears up for a major streetscape program and local building owners are getting involved.

You will find a rendering of the approved streetscape plan for downtown Harvard on page four of this newsletter. Landscaping, new lighting and planters are just part of the project that the City plans to complete during 2008.

In keeping with the spirit of that effort, the City of Harvard is offering interest-free loans to downtown building owners who are planning exterior facade renovation

projects that are designed to enhance the historic look and feel of the central downtown district. These projects could include tuckpointing or refinishing of exterior surfaces, including paint and brick and other 'facelift' projects. Building owners who qualify for the project can borrow up to \$50,000 per project, repayable in equal installments over five years. Eligible costs include site development and renovation of existing buildings or leasehold improvements only. One such loan has already been approved for the building at 101 W. Front Street.

Funding for these loans comes from the City's former revolving loan fund. Contact City Hall for details on loan program eligibility.

The changing of the seasons means that school is back in session and that Trick or Treaters will soon be out. Be careful while driving, especially as we near the darker winter months. Watch the Community Sign for information on city events and programs, including notifications of snow emergencies and other need to know resident information.

Did You Know? By Keith Gibson, Utilities Superintendent

Please be considerate of our environment in regards to chemical disposal. The City of Harvard Wastewater Treatment Facility is not capable of breaking down toxins in chemicals and paints and these products can disrupt the treatment process.

Please be aware that it is illegal to:

- Dump chemicals down sinks or toilets;
- Dump chemicals in City storm drains;
- Dump chemicals in yards. One gallon of gas can contaminate 10,000 gallons of ground water with benzene.

Illegal waste disposal pollutes the environment and can also trigger an explosive atmosphere in your home!

The City of Harvard meters water supplied to the residents and businesses. Industry standards accept a loss of 19% of the water that we pump, due to firefighting, hydrant flushing, street sweeping, etc. The City is currently realizing a loss of approximately 23%. If you know of any illegal water usage, which could include tampering with fire hydrants or known un-metered water usage, call the Utility Department at 943-6626. Thank you for your cooperation!

Leaf Vacuuming Schedule

Leaf vacuuming will tentatively occur from Oct. 1 through Nov. 31, depending on weather conditions and when leaves begin to fall. Please rake your leaves to the curb, NOT INTO THE STREET. Marengo Disposal will vacuum through the end of November, weather permitting. Contact them at 943-4939 with any questions.

Snow Removal

Winter is just around the corner. Remember: All vehicles must be off city streets following a two-inch snowfall. This enables city workers to plow and salt the roads quickly. If a snow emergency is declared, all vehicles must be removed from the streets immediately. A snow emergency can be declared before an expected two-inch snowfall and will be posted on the Community Sign as soon as possible. If there is any question as to whether an emergency has been called or terminated, call the Public Works Dept. at 943-4161 or the Police Dept. at 943-4431.

Fall Brush Pick-Up

Fall brush pickup will begin on Monday, Oct. 8 and continue until all wards have been picked up. THIS WILL BE THE LAST BRUSH PICKUP UNTIL APRIL. Please place brush at the curb of the street by that Monday. Brush must be at least three feet long. This is a safety measure for our employees. Shorter branches pose a hazard when feeding them into the chipper. When placing branches at the curb, stack the brush in a manner that is easily picked up from the street, with the large ends at the curb. This makes it easier, faster and more efficient to remove. A 20-minute time limit for each stop is City policy. Arrangements can be made to remove the rest of the pile at a cost to the owner of \$125.00 an hour. A minimum charge of \$50.00 will apply. For branches that come down as a result of a storm, please place them at the curb and notify Public Works at 943-4161.

Hydrant Flushing Schedule

The Utilities Dept. will be flushing dead end lines during the week of Oct. 15-19. Hydrant flushing may create rust and brown-colored water. The water is safe to drink but will stain clothes that are washed in it. If you experience rusty water, let your faucet run until clear.

Special Recreation Program

Do you know someone with a disability who would like to go out, have fun and make new friends? From the Building Department

Beware of Illegal Connections!

We know that it is tempting for a homeowner to connect the output from sump pumps or roof downspouts directly into the sanitary sewer system. Unfortunately, this results in huge problems at the sewer plants. When it rains, even a single downspout or sump pump can add a very large amount of excess flow to the system. This increases the cost of plant operation (electricity and chemicals to pump and process the extra water), and has the potential to result in costly damage to the sewer treatment plant during heavy rainfalls. Damage drives up sewer rates and creates the potential for backups into homes due to an over-capacitated system.

Hookups like these are illegal. Those of you who know that you have an illegal hookup should disconnect it immediately. If you are unsure of the status of your hookups, contact the City of Harvard at 943-6468 and we will help you identify existing issues. In the future, the City will implement a door-to-door program to determine if structures have illegal connections. We will not impose fines on those who cooperate with us to solve this problem. This year's festivities will include:


- A Craft Fair at Central School from 9 AM 3 PM

















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From the **POLICE DEPARTMENT** By Police Chief Dan Kazy-Garey

I would like to introduce myself to those who do not know me. I was appointed Harvard's new Chief of Police on April 10, 2007. I have been a member of the Harvard Police Department since April of 1984 and have held assignments in every function of the department. It has been a personal goal of mine to serve as your Police Chief since the day that I was hired. I look forward to serving and working with the community to help make Harvard an even better place to live and work. If there is anything that you would like to ask or report, I am normally in the office Monday through Friday from 7 AM until 3 PM. Fall officially begins on September 23. During this season, Harvard residents enjoy many traditions, including football, fall colors, hunting and Halloween. The Police Department would like to take this opportunity to offer these safety suggestions to everyone in the community, especially during Halloween:

Children

- Always carry a flashlight while Trick or Treating.
- Only Trick or Treat with an adult or older sibling.
- Never talk or go anywhere with a stranger.
- Costumes should be a bright color and have reflective material.
- Avoid using ill-fitting masks. Instead, use make-up or face paint that is hypoallergenic and non-toxic to provide unobstructed vision.
- Costumes and shoes should be fitted to avoid tripping.
- Do not carry fake swords, guns, knives or similar accessories that look real. Make sure that they are flexible and cannot harm anyone.
- Do not run.
- Do not cross the street between parked cars. Always cross at an intersection and look BOTH ways.
- Walk on sidewalks. Do not run between homes or on lawns.
- Respect everyone's property.
- Trick or Treat on a designated route that your parents are aware of.
- Carry an extra Trick or Treat bag in case you fill your bag or break it.
- Never eat any treats until your parent or guardian checks them under bright lighting for signs of tampering. Do not eat fruit, homemade items or any unwrapped candy.
- Say Thank You and have fun!



Parents

- Remind your children of the above safety tips.
- Plan a designated Trick or Treat route and times for your children.
- Always inspect your children's treats for signs of tampering.
- Accompany your children while they Trick or Treat.
- Consider hosting a Halloween party rather than Trick or Treating.
- If you are driving, be cautious of other children who may not be paying attention.
- Review 'Stop, Drop and Roll' with your children in the event that a costume catches fire.
- Report any suspicious activities to the Harvard Police at 943-4431 or by calling 9-1-1.

Homeowners

- If you welcome Trick or Treaters to your home, please turn your porch light on.
- Do not invite children into your home.
- Only distribute pre-packaged treats.
- Please secure your dogs in your home to avoid contact with Trick or Treaters.
- Remove any hazards from your yard or porch that could cause a child to trip and fall.
- Do not use candles to illuminate any decoration.
- Report any suspicious activities to the Harvard Police at 943-4431 or by calling 9-1-1.

I would also like to take this opportunity to remind residents of several Harvard City Ordinances that are applicable all year long, but most timely during the fall and winter seasons:

- Open burning with the City of Harvard is prohibited.
- Blowing grass and leaves into the street is prohibited.
- Parking on any City of Harvard street between 1 AM and 5 AM is prohibited.
- Parking is not allowed on any City street during or after a significant snowstorm. You may call the Police Department or see the community sign for information on snow emergencies.
- Depositing snow into the street is prohibited.
- Do not park across a sidewalk.
- Loud music that can be heard from distances greater than 50 feet is most often prohibited.
