The Harvard Police Department Citizens' Police Academy provides a mechanism for educating the public about the criminal justice system and ways to resist crime. Harvard Police personnel conduct the classes which are coordinated by the Community Relations Officer.

This is an opportunity for citizens to gain insight into the difficult tasks of police officers, and provides responsible citizens with comprehensive knowledge of police operations, practices, and objectives. Participants in the Academy learn how they can help to keep the community crime-free, and become resources for improved community/police involvement.
